

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

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Rules and Feeding Arrangements

The race will be run under the Rules of the League of W.A. Wheelmen,

Each rider will be supplied with a number which will be securely fastened and worn on the lower portion of the back. Numbers must be returned to the Number Steward immediately after the finish.

Immediately a rider becomes a non-contestant he must remove his official

Any person not being a competitor shall not ride with or near any competitor, nor assist him in any way. Any competitor breaking this rule shall be fined or disqualified for any period that the Referee and Stewards may determine.

Two brakes must be fitted to each machine and handle-bars must be plugged.

Riders must claim places with the Claim Steward.

Riders may accept refreshments at any stage of the race other than after entering Great Northern Highway, Midland, to the finishing line.

Refreshments cannot be accepted from a moving vehicle; must be given to competitors by persons on foot, in a non-breakable container.



HISTORY OF THE RACE

Down through the hills they come once again, the gravel-stained warriors of this year's "Beverley," coming along that same old red road as their predecessors came more than half a century ago, chasing the immortal honour of a faist or "fastest" in the greatest of all West Australian road races-the "Beverley." From the quiet town of Beverley, through York, Northam and Lloyd's Crossing, into the lonely hills, up those dreaded climbs of Nine Mile, Wooro oo, the Gidgies, down the breathless glide of Red Hill, down to Perth, to fame and heart-break, to exultant success and shattered ambitions.

Long before the automobile, in 1897, Johnny Beck had won first and fastest in the first Beverley. What a venturous expedition it was in those days; the rider went unescorted from town to town, the telegraph flashed his progress down to Perth, then he was swallowed up in the uninhabited hills, and nothing was known of him until he came into Midland Junction several hours later. And so history recorded the early Beverleys, of such feats as Alec Jeweil winning off scratch in 1901, a performance never since equalled; of Charlie Howard winning at 12½ m.p.h. through a sea of mud in 1905; of Gus Kaiser, in 1911, reducing the record to 5.58.33, being the first man to come down from Beverley in under six hours.

The 1914-18 war called a halt to the now well-established race. On resumption, the old war-horse, Alf Schulze, made three successive fastest times off scratch, an unbroken record which may be equalled today. K. Williams and K. Block won and gained fastest time honours off fantastic handicaps in 1923 and 1924. Free-wheel devices were introduced in 1925, and a new generation of fast-pedalling cyclists came into being and drove out the old-time big-gear slugger. This was the golden age of the "Beverley," of such giants as Freddie Jones, H. K. Smith, Bill and Horrie Marshall. What epic duels were fought between Jones and Marshall! Jones gained three fastest times and a first, but Marshall brought the record down to 5.21.14.

The 1934 race lapsed, but the 1935 "Beverley" saw a record high in prize money and starters, and the flying South Australian, Deane Toseland, lowered

the record to 5.15.38.

Because of the now deteriorating condition of the ancient road, a change of course-through Baker's Hill and Sawyer's Valley-was adopted in 1937. The 54-year-old veteran, W. J. Maher, who had been fastest in 1908, won off the generous mark of 90 minutes on a freak bicycle, while W.R. Appleton rode down in 5.12.25, the fastest of all "Beverleys" to that date.

The new course demanded shorter limits and handicaps, until "Toti" Bosser won first and fastest off the tight mark of 3½ minutes in 1940. The same rider also gained fastest time in 1941 and 1947, and thus stood on the same

pedestal as Schulze and Jones.

In 1947 the race went back to the original road, Andy Priestley winning comfortably from the 19 minute mark. With the shortest limit (25 minutes) and the biggest scratch bunch (7 riders) of all time in 1948, a back-marker's victory was predicted. However, D. Dawson (13 minutes) and J. Truran (16 minutes) engaged in a memorable pursuit race from Red Hill to the finish. Dawson caught Truran 20 yards from the line and won by inches only.

Another drastic change was to run the race in the reverse direction in 1951 and 1952. The celebrated Norm Burdus gained fastest time both years. The 1952 race was won with distinction by Frank Suckling and Burdus covered himself with glory to lower the race record down to 4.57.45 and became the

first man to cover the journey in under five hours.

Last year the race was once again from Beverley to Perth along the famous old road. Cec. Tregilles, a champion rider 25 years earlier, won at the tender age of 44 years, while Les Suckling, 18-year-old brother of Frank, made a name for himself by reducing the record to 4.56.33.

Who will be the winners of today's race? Will the flying Oliver brothers or Peter Panton be the first to win from scratch for more than 50 years? Will they break the record? By four o'clock today we will know. Another "Beverley" is run, another name raised to the roll of honour, and the glorious traditions of the old race remain with undiminished lustre.

THE H. ELLIOTT SHIELD.—This shield is presented by Elliotts Cycles, to be held for 12 months. Elliotts Store Permanent Trophy is donated by Mr. H. Elliott (of Elliotts Store), an ex-amateur cyclist and an ex-secretary and president of the W.A. Amateur Cyclists Union, as permanent trophy. It is designed to add to the value of the Beverley Prize List, a trophy which will accord with the high tradition of the "Blue Ribbon" event of professional road cycling in West Australia. Value of the Herb Elliott Shield, 25 guineas; value of the Replica, 6 guineas.

THE GURNEY TROPHY.—This trophy is donated each year to the memory of Stan Gurney, who was awarded a posthumous Victoria Cross for gallantry and unselfish bravery in silencing enemy machine-gun posts by bayonet assault at Tel El Eisa on July 22, 1942. Donors to this trophy are: Mrs. D. Hill, Messrs. H. Opperman, H. C. Elliott, H. Baldwin, D. Roberts, W. J. Lucas, A. McD. Haddow, A. Schulze, J. Bailey, and V. Waltham.

Last year we mentioned that one of the founders of this trophy, Mr. J. Smith, had passed on. Since last year's "Beverley" the actual founder of the trophy, Mr. D. Hill, has passed on after a long illness. Mr. Hill was an Amateur Official' for many years, and was held in high esteem by all who knew him. It is Mrs. Hill's wish that Don's name should remain with the donors.
